CITY TO SPONSOR KID-TECH COMPUTER CLASSES

City youth ages 6--14 can earn a **FREE** refurbished computer and develop computer skills during a free, 10-week KidTech computer course. Two sessions, Jan. 8 -- March 20 and April 22 -- June 26, will be offered by the City's Bureau of Recreation at Avenue D Community Center, 200 Avenue D. During each session, participants will meet for one hour after school on both Tuesday and Thursday. Specific times will be determined once enrollment is completed.

"Developing computer skills is essential to school success and life-long learning," said Mayor Robert J. Duffy. "We want to provide these and other asset-building opportunities to city youth through our recreation programming."

Participants will be introduced to graphic design, word processing, spreadsheet development, internet use and other computer skills. The Slater's Raiders are driven to make a positive change in the city of Rochester. This movement is an effort to address the violence and criminal acts of black youth and young adults, which has captured and enraged a once mild mannered city. Slater's Raiders for Peace will conduct surveillance in those sectors of the city where violent crimes have taken place and where known criminals & gang activity have been identified. In order for the city of Rochester to remain safe we must protect our children, elders, and other community members at large by not permitting them to become desensitized to violent behavior. Our community along with our elected officials and law enforcement must unite to eliminate or reduce all acts of violence in our city! We must rebuild the fabric of our Neighborhoods, block by block, sector by sector. We shall have one common goal, to raise our families in a safe and productive community.

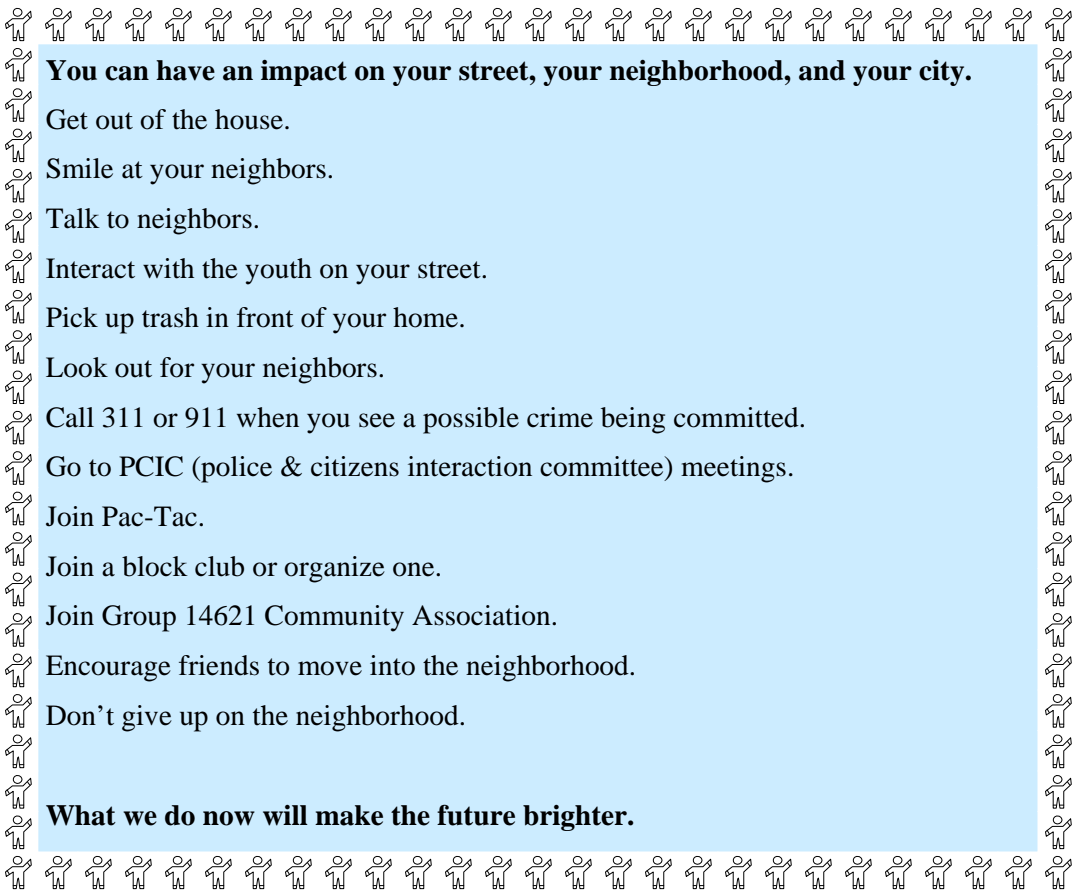
